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RESTRAINING ORDER ISSUED ON SALE OF PIONEERTOWN

A permanent restraining order has been issued by the San Bernardino County Superior Court in the proposed sale of Pioneer town on a \$80,000 debt.

The sale was originally scheduled for Dec. 17, but was put off twice by a temporary restraining order, and has now been set tentatively for Jan. 15, according to J. W. Berry of Security Title Insurance & Guaranty Co.

The restraining order was issued at the request of Attorney Daniel J. Covert and Charles E. Ward in behalf of Pioneer Studio Locations, Inc.

The studio, which has a 25-year lease on the property, asks that the position be cleared up before the 20,000-acre Old West subdivision is sold.

Security Title holds the trust deed for a \$80,000 loan made in 1946 to Pioneer directors, who have announced they cannot meet the terms. Interest and other expenses have shown the total up to \$80,000.

Berry indicated the sale probably be continued until the studio's position is clarified by the courts.

Del Rosa Commercial Zone Petition Before Planners

Residents of Del Rosa Estates were said to have "hit the ceiling" this week as notices from the San Bernardino planning department indicated that a request has been filed for a commercial zone on Del Rosa avenue.

The request, to be considered at the Jan. 14 meeting of the Planning Commission, was made by James Nechval, owner and operator of the Estates Market, 3489 Del Rosa Ave., together with G. C. Krowco, home builder in the area. Col. Theodore E. Baker, president of the Del Rosa Estates, also said that petitions objecting to the zone change and any further extension of a commercial center are being circulated.

"Property owners near the proposed zone change are up in arms about it," Baker said.

"The change of zone requires a change from single family residential to C-2a commercial for a 115-foot strip along the west side of Del Rosa avenue between East 21st street and Los Flores drive.

Posting was also made on a petition of Mrs. Adah E. Holland, an ambulatory rest home for aged people limited to four cases for 718 Fairview Dr.

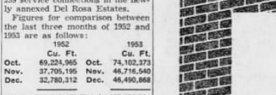
The lines were placed 255 cubic feet valves and 128 new fire hydrants.

begin. An SBA representative could be contacted in San Bernardino if it is deemed necessary, he added.

SBA loans are for rebuilding and replacing damaged structures, not for improvements, and all claims are considered individually, Haggas said.

Loans for businesses sustaining losses are made on a 10-year basis at 6 per cent interest, while home loans are for 20 years at 3 per cent. The ceiling on any one loan is \$10,000.

parked near the liquor store with its engine idling at the time of the holdup and took down the license number, which was turned over to Riverside police.

CASH SAID FOUND

A radio broadcast of the license number led to the spotting of the car by Riverside officers near the downtown area. The car was searched, \$87 in cash was found stuffed down alongside of a seat and a quantity of liquor in the trunk.

According to Yost, one of the men has been identified by Art Stambler, clerk at the Annex Liquor Store, 1280 Hilltop Ave., San Bernardino, as one of the two henchmen who robbed him of \$100 at 8:45 p.m. Tuesday.

Yost said photos of the two men will be shown to the many other victims of holdups in San Bernardino during the past month.

"Up to now, these are our most promising leads in the solving of the numerous robberies of liquor stores and service stations in and around San Bernardino," said Yost.

He added descriptions of the two men:
