

Coronation of Queen Planned

Mexican independence will be celebrated in San Bernardino with a Thursday night coronation at Queen Elena Roman and Friday night dance in Municipal Auditorium and a parade Saturday.

Mayor Raymond H. Crockett, Sr. Veron Ave. The line of march will be south to 6th St. and east on L. St. where it will disband at the Casa del Mexico restaurant during the coronation. A program interspersed with dancing and music to begin at 8 p.m. Thursday in Municipal Auditorium.

MAN RULED GUILTY OF RECEIVING STOLEN PROPERTY
