ARVIN, April 20.—Harvey O. Banks, director of the State Department of Water Resources, believes that water from the Feather River can be delivered in Kern County by 1965 if the current state water plans move on schedule.

Farm Workers in San Joaquin Valley Needed

FRESNO, April 20.—Bent and Nelson farmers and other growers in several sections of the San Joaquin Valley, according to a report from the state Department of Employment.

C. W. Fahrner, a Department of Employment farm placement supervisor, said the best and most plentiful work is needed in the Los Bani area and the orange groves are needed in the Pomona, Linday, Visalia and Cudahy districts.

"Farm activities are employing about 125,000 people, compared to 115,000 a year ago and 118,000 at this time in 1937."
