

# Colton, River, & Sea Water to Flow Soon

SAN BERNARDINO County will start flowing in the Santa Ana River from Colton to the sea in about a month and also will begin making use of the Orange County Water District.

"One of the major factors that have agreed to purchase 100,000 acre feet of high quality Northern California water from Merced in the Delta District between November and June of next year is to use one of the 300,000 acre feet in the next three years. Orange County is especially anxious to have this water," according to Langdon W. Owen, OCWD secretary general, located on San bottled water residence area in Hollywood and 28 per cent for water softeners.

The water is to be used in Orange County family about \$27 a year on the residential side. It will be used for irrigation, water, boats, fixtures and shower heads, water heaters, and flower beds, but water softeners and air conditioning.

Owen estimates the Northern California water from the California Aqueduct, which passes through San Bernardino,

has a total dissolved solids count of 230 parts per million compared to 800-900 ppm of the water from the Anaheim and Orange.

The recommended level for drinking water set by the U.S. Department of Public Health is 500 ppm.

"These cities have such TDS because of the accumulative effect of increasing Colorado River water," Owen said.

The only way Orange County can receive the water at this time from the source is to use one of the three taps in the Colton area, one south of the San Bernardino River into Little Creek Wash and the other two south of the freeway into the Santa Ana River. Owen's plan is making studies to see which tap is the best one to use.

In mid-1973, MWD expects to use the Balboa branch pipeline completed to the San Antonio Wash where the Orange County water district can tap into a 800,000-gallon to the Santa Ana River in the area of the Orange and Northern California water via that route.

Owen expects the high quality imported water to be used in the Orange County water district in 1973-74, a total of 4,000 feet deep.

and located has been fully pumped in the 1972-73 fiscal year, the water district plans to reach 270,000 gallons (74.5 billion gallons) of water. An estimated 25 million gallons of water to cover an acre of land to a depth of one foot, or 25,000 gallons.

It takes about 24 million gallons to supply 4,000 feet.

## Pets, Owners Reunion Firm Raises Doubts

SAN BERNARDINO — A new business designed to reunite pets and their lost owners raised questions among animal rescuers in the city business league office.

A press release issued by the Pet Patrol called the business a "service," and labeled itself a "non-profit organization."

Although Pet Patrol does not yet have local members, its owners say it is a non-profit organization because of how, it simply hasn't made a profit.

Michael Ross opened Pet Patrol on Sept. 15. The owners must pay \$13 for the service.

Ross has a classified advertisement in this newspaper which says "If you have lost or found a pet, call Pet Patrol" and it shows number and address. Ross says he will take a description and other information about the animal and enter it in his file.

"If an owner who has lost a pet calls, Ross then invites him to his office. For \$11, Ross explains, the owner can then search the service's files. Ross will search his files and the dog pound in an attempt to locate the pet.

The state of California pet code, Section 485, states:

"One who finds lost property under circumstances which give him knowledge or means of inquiry as to the true owner, and who appropriate such property to his own use, or to the use of another person not entitled thereto, without first making reasonable

inquiries to locate the owner, is liable for the value of the property." Ross says he has not heard of any cases where a person has been convicted under this law.

### New Zoning Will Expand Businesses

SAN BERNARDINO — Re-zoning to allow more types of commercial development around the Fontenot area.

Highway 10 and Redwood Lane in the Valley View Subdivision area was rezoned last week by the county planning commission.

The commission said the change from C-1 (neighborhood business) to C-2 (general commercial) zoning would allow a wide variety of businesses to expand and improve their properties.

President Eddie Beverly endorsed the rezoning, saying the rezoning should be approved only under conditions if several rezoning projects are closed up.

But because the change would encourage improvement of most businesses that are now in C-1, the rezoning is approved. C-2 is a more comprehensive zone, allowing a wider range of commercial activities in the same area.

The rezoning will be approved by the board of supervisors.

The meeting will be at the Frazer Inn, said area president Harry E. Reynolds.

## Water Project Gets Environment Report

BOULDER CITY, Nev. — A final environmental impact statement for the \$2 billion Colton Aqueduct project has been filed by the Bureau of Reclamation.

The President's Fiscal 1973 budget contains \$2 billion to begin construction of the four dams and 27 miles of aqueduct that will carry water to the Tinajas to deliver an average of 12 million acre feet of Colorado River water to the central and eastern parts of California.

The budget also contains \$30 million for further construction of the Navajo lower plumb project in northern Arizona, which will furnish the electricity to pump the water 2,500 feet in elevation during its journey.

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## San Diego County Gets Federal Funds For City Refuse Disposal Experiment

SAN DIEGO — San Diego County is one of three areas sharing over \$14 million in Environmental Protection Agency grant funding to try experimental methods of disposing of municipal refuse.

The county is getting \$2,982,718 in federal money to build a \$4,622,218 facility to serve the communities of Escondido and San Marcos.

Municipal wastes will be converted into fuel oil by the pyrolysis process (heating in the absence of oxygen). The fuel oil will be sold to operate electric generating plants. Metal and glass will also be recovered for recycling.

Mex., officials plan a \$12 million facility to recover materials from noncombustible refuse. They hope to extract 250 tons of metals and glass a day.

Baltimore officials are constructing a \$4 million resource recovery facility where 1,000 tons of solid waste a day of the city's refuse, will be converted to fuel gas which will be recovered from the waste stream.

Here, again, the pyrolysis process will be used. It is becoming more and more popular as American technology adapts the method long in use in Europe.

Many international experts in this waste disposal have the pyrolysis process mentioned over others, including "Dr. Frank H. Bowerman, of the University of Southern California.

## Man Who Directed 123 Movies Dies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Editor George Ulmer, who directed 123 motion pictures in a career he began as a set decorator, is dead at age 66.

Ulmer died Saturday at the Motion Picture Hospital in Woodland Hills, a suburb of Los Angeles. He had suffered a series of strokes.

Born in Vienna, Ulmer studied music and architecture before coming to the United States in 1923 and worked as a set decorator before directing his first film, "Mr. Bowdler," in 1937.

Funeral services are scheduled Tuesday morning at Hollywood Cemetery.

## Bald Eagle May Vanish From California's Coast

SAN BERNARDINO — The once abundant American Bald Eagle, official America's symbol since 1963, may be vanishing from California's coast.

The bald eagle once nested in abundance on the Channel Islands, but now it seems to exist only on the Sierra Nevada, Cascade and Klamath mountains.

Reasons for its decline are disturbance of nesting birds, illegal shooting, loss of nesting trees and pesticides.

The male adult bald eagle has a wingspan of six and one half feet, stands a yard high and weighs from eight to 18 1/2 pounds.

The female is larger, standing 42 inches high, according to the Bureau of Land Management. "New Birds"
