Strive to Attract Conventions, Speaker Tells Businessmen

APPLE VALLEY — Only 34 cities in six western states are equipped to handle large conventions and only 15 of these have been approved by the National Assoc. of Conventions.

"For this reason," said Lucian E. Walther, manager of the High Desert Convention Bureau, "Victor Valley businessmen should strive to attract conventions. Our location is ideal. . . . We have any expenditure on part of businessmen."

During the business meeting, Win St. Arson, president, told members that widening of State Highway 13, from Desert Knolls to Apple Valley Village, is now programmed on the 1966-67 budget, just released by the Economic Development Commission.

"To my knowledge, it hasn't been programmed for the next two years," he added. Work on State Highway 18 is planned near Cedar Springs.

An appeal for support of the project will be sent to California State Chamber of Commerce and EDC, according to Mrs. Linnea Anderson, secretary-managing.

Needles to Underwrite Promotional Program

NEEDLES — Needles will announce a sign promotional program designed to bring more traffic through the city in cooperation with the Needles Motel Association and the Chamber of Commerce, to the tune of \$100,000, at a meeting of the city council Tuesday. City Manager Ellis Foote was instructed to budget that amount towards a annual cost of the signs.

Mr. Jerry Nicholson, spokesman for the motel association, said that the city would lose on the room occupancy tax along with the motel people and other businesses dependent upon tourism.

Other business transacted at the council meeting included instructions to the city manager to have a sixteen tract motel of a Street appraised and a city-owned building to be advertised for bids. This action was taken because there has been a request to purchase the property.

ADELANTO — Directors of Adelanto Community Service District yesterday served notice on the City of Victorville that they will "vigorously oppose" any move to relocate the existing route of U.S. Highway 295.

The state set the present route in 1935, and the future economy of Adelanto is "directly related" to it, the April 11 resolution notes.

Victorville's master general plan consultant, Herman H. Ruth, has suggested by various maps a relocation of the U.S.

At a recent unveiling of the proposed new general plan for the city of Oakland, Calif., the city council has requested the state can still be permitted to adapt the new alignment.

They also note that design-

She was one of the founders of the As Grinders Club of Hollywood, an organization devoted chiefly to charitable work. She formerly owned the party where the famous Las Vegas Strip is now located, and at one time owned the Saratoga Springs land in Death Valley.
