

Ventura County to Keep Teen Dance Hall Ban

VENTURA—A ban on privately-owned teenage dance halls in the county will be retained by the Board of Supervisors on the recommendation of Loren Enoch, county executive officer.

Enoch told the board that schools and parks and recreation authorities are best equipped to sponsor "wholesome and beneficial teenage dances."

He said with the restrictions necessary for a private club it would be "extremely doubtful that a private, profit-making teenage club could compete with entertainment sponsored by a nonprofit organization."

The issues were raised when the Sheriff's Department inadvertently issued a dance hall license to Mrs. Helen Gilmer of Simi Valley, a teen-age center.

Mrs. Gilmer told the supervisors she had invested

\$3,000 in the club by the time Ench advised her she was in violation of a county ordinance.

The supervisors were sympathetic and pondered giving Mrs. Gilmer a year to operate the club, but Mrs. Gilmer told them she has lost so much money since her license was taken back that she feels she could not recoup her losses.

San Barbara Horse, Flower Show to Open

SANTA BARBARA — Show horses will vie for attention with Hawaiian dancers and other local entertainers at the 67th annual Santa Barbara Horse and Flower Show opening here tonight.

The dancers will be a part of the "Hawaii Comes to Santa Barbara" theme of this year's nine-day show at Earl Warren

More than 80,000 in cash premiums and trophies will be handed out to winners in the horse show and the Flower and Garden Show, according to Allen Ross, secretary-manager of the sponsoring 19th District Agricultural Assn.

Nightly Hawaiian entertainment, featuring specialty dances, music and a fashion show exhibiting latest Polynesian styling, will be staged at both the 3,000-seat arena and the Flower Pavilion.

More than 600 show horses and riders from throughout the West will vie in 11 horse show performances, including nine evening shows and two matinees.

The horse show opens at 7:30 tonight, with the Flower Show opening at 6 p.m.

San Diego Board Backs Vote Counting Devices

County Orders End to 'Human Errors' Responsible for Long Delays in Returns

SAN DIEGO — County Supervisors voted confidence in electronic vote counting machines Thursday, but ordered elimination of "human errors" responsible for long delays in primary election returns June 7.

The board acted after a long session with Registrar of Voters Charles Sexton, who assured them that a manual recount in the 26th District State Senate Republican race confirmed accuracy of the machines.

Assemblyman Hale Ashburn's "damning" recount after the machines showed he lost the nomination to Clair W. Burchgess by 700 votes.

Section said the manual count showed Burchgess picking up 70 votes, and that this discrepancy was due to one of the many "human errors" marring the election.

Such errors included the handling and filing of ballots and their transportation to the county's single return tabulating center, he said.

Supervisors directed studies of the feasibility of establishing branch counting centers, and of using

regular county employees to reinforce and instruct relatively untrained temporary election workers.

Rites Will Be Held for Woman, 110

INDIO—Services for a 110-year-old Coachella Valley woman who died and left 210 close relatives will be conducted at 7:30 a.m. Saturday in the Episcopal Church of Indio.

Mrs. Laura Hernandez died Wednesday night in an Indio convalescent home. She was born in Guaymas, Mex., in 1855, came to Arizona in 1890 and settled in Coachella 35 years later.

She leaves two daughters, Mrs. Dolores Grajeda and Mrs. Carmen Torres; a son, Manuel; 26 grandchildren, 141 great-grandchildren and 36 great-great-grandchildren.

Hearings Start on Vast Board Rejects Desert-Mountain Areas Hospital Plans for Firebaugh

SAN BERNARDINO — The County Planning Commission has begun hearings on proposed general plans for a vast 10,000-acre, mile desert area and 600,000 acres in the San Bernardino Mountains.

The plans are intended to serve as development guides for the next 20 years. They do not spell out specific uses for each area. The next in the series of hearings will be held July 20.

Planners utilized the so-called broad brush approach and created several new land use categories for the two plans, the same as they did with the general plan for San Bernardino Valley.

The planning department hopes to complete the plans for the entire county by Aug. 31.

The plan for the entire stretch of the San Gabriel and San Bernardino mountains from the county line on the west to the Fontenot area on the east and emphasizes conservation of natural re-

sources. For the most part it is the management plan of the U.S. Forest Service.

It indicates in a broad, general way urbanizing areas, critical urban areas (the fire fronts at the base of the mountains), forest land and open and conservation use.

Desert land use categories include urbanizing areas, special service centers, rural retreat areas, defense reservations, recreation-conservation areas, agricultural areas and resource reserve areas.

Services Set for Poster Girl, 5

Vanicia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard von Beber Jr., died Tuesday. She had been in and out of the City of Hope hospital for the last two years with leukemia.

FRESNO — Plans for setting up a Firebaugh hospital district in western Fresno County have been turned down by the county's Local Agency Formation Commission.

However, the denial was without prejudice, which means the proponents of the district can refile an application without having to wait a year before bringing up the plans again.

The commission action came after James T. Adair of the Office of Regional Health Planning of the south San Joaquin Valley said a district hospital is not needed now and the assumed valuation available would not support a hospital.

Adair said the area has "a surplus of medical people" but said the answer could be a clinic rather than a hospital.
